## Christian Virtue: An Advent Talk-and-Discussion Series

Peter Scotchmer is offering a series of one-hour talk-and-discussion lectures on several Christian Virtues as these make their presence felt in a number of significant literary works. These lectures will take place at 9:30 am each Sunday during Advent before the 10:30 am High Mass and will be scheduled as follows:

**Dec. 1:** Introduction to the series:

**Prayers of the People** 

**Dec. 8:** Temperance: Fitzgerald's The Great Gatsby;

Dec. 15: Diligence: Bunyan's Pilgrim's Progress;

Dec. 22: Love: Shakespeare's King Lear.

The series is projected to continue in January if interest warrants. While it is helpful for participants to have read each work in advance, no prior knowledge of each is assumed. Interest is the sole requirement.

## **Advent and the Four Last Things**

**Death**, **Judgement**, **Hell**, and **Heaven** have been traditional themes for Advent meditation, representations of which will be depicted on the bulletin covers for the four Sundays in Advent, taken from Hieronymus Bosch's *The Seven Deadly Sins and the Four Last Things*, c.1500. Last week featured **Death**, reminding us that although death came about because of sin, our redemption ultimately comes through it, following Jesus' own death and resurrection to new life: "for as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive... O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?" (I Cor 15).

Today, **Judgement** is featured, a theme which is fortuitously found throughout much of the text contained in both the lectionary and minor propers of the mass (Introit, Gradual, etc.). As well, each time we recite the Nicene Creed, we declare that Jesus "shall come again with glory to judge both the quick and the dead: Whose kingdom shall have no end." The resurrection of the dead, "of both the just the unjust" (Acts 24), will precede the last judgement. Christ will come "in his glory, and all the holy angels with him... Before him shall be gathered all nations: and he shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats: and he shall set the sheep on his right hand, but the goats on the left... And these shall go away into everlasting punishment: but the righteous into life eternal." (Matt 25)

Perhaps one of the most difficult concepts of the Christian Faith is the idea of bodily resurrection. Even in the early church, Paul went to great lengths to explain how and why this will come about, to which I Corinthians 15 attests. The devout Anglican, Charles Jennens, in compiling texts from the Bible and *Book of Common Prayer* for the libretto of Handel's *Messiah*, sought to combat the deism of the 18<sup>th</sup> century:

I know that my Redeemer liveth, and that he shall stand at the latter day upon the earth. And though worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God. (Job 19) For now is Christ risen from the dead, the first fruits of them that Sleep. (I Cor 15) Take that, deists and dualists!

William Beveridge, an English bishop of the early 18<sup>th</sup> century has a colourful explanation of the resurrection of the body at the last judgement in his catechism:

By the Resurrection of the Body, I here understand and believe, that every Body that ever was informed or endued with a reasonable Soul and is afterwards parted from it by Death, although it be then reduced to Earth again, or eaten up of Worms, or Beasts, or Fishes, or any other way consumed, and the Parts of it scattered abroad and dispersed all over the Earth, yet at the last Day all the Parts and Particles of it shall come together again, every one into its proper Place where it was before, so as to make up again the same individual Body; to which the same Soul that before departed from it, being again united, the same Person that before died, shall revive, or rise to life again.

The second coming of our Lord will differ from his first coming. He came first in great humility at the Incarnation; His second coming will be in awful majesty. His first coming was as the Saviour of the world: He will come again to be our Judge. It is in commemoration of these great events, the one in the past, the other

in the future, that the Church keeps the season of Advent. Only the Father knows the day and the hour (though there are many attempts at eschatological guesswork). The day of judgement will be the day of justice, when all life's inequalities will be put right, and will reveal that God's justice triumphs over all the injustices committed by his creatures and that his love is stronger than death.

On that day, the books will be opened and everyone will be judged according to their works (Rev 20). St. Basil writes, "Blessed is that soul, which day and night hath no other care than how, in the great day, when every creature shall stand around the Judge to give an account of their works, she shall be able to relate her life. For whosovever continually places that day and that hour before his eyes, and ever thinks of his defence at that most just tribunal, is likely to commit no sins, or at least very few."

O, what fear man's bosom rendeth, When from heav'n the Judge descendeth, On whose sentence all dependeth!

Wondrous sound the trumpet flingeth, Through earth's sepulchres it ringeth, All before the throne it bringeth.

Death is struck, and nature quaking, All creation is awaking, To its Judge an answer making.

Lo! the book exactly worded, Wherein all hath been recorded: Thence shall judgments be awarded.

When the Judge his seat attaineth, And each hidden deed arraigneth, Nothing undisclos'd remaineth.

What shall I, frail man, be pleading? Who for me be interceding, When the just are mercy needing?

King of majesty tremendous, Who dost free salvation send us, Fount of pity then befriend us!

Think, kind Jesu! my salvation Caused thy wondrous Incarnation; Leave me not to reprobation. Faint and weary thou hast sought me, On the Cross of suffring bought me; Shall such grace be vainly brought me?

Righteous Judge! for sin's pollution Grant thy gift of absolution, Ere that day of retribution.

Guilty, now I pour my moaning, All my shame with anguish owning: Spare, O God, thy suppliant groaning!

Through the sinful woman shriven, Through the dying thief forgiven, Thou to me a hope hast given.

Worthless are my prayers and sighing, Yet, good Lord, in grace complying, Rescue me from night undying.

With thy sheep a place provide me, From the goats afar divide me, To thy right hand do thou guide me.

When the wicked are confounded, Doom'd to shame and woe unbounded, Call me, with thy Saints surrounded.

Low I kneel, with heart's submission; See, like ashes my contrition! Help me in my last condition!

Ah! that day of tears and mourning! From the dust of earth returning. Man for judgement must prepare him:

Spare, O God, in mercy spare him! Lord, all pitying, Jesu blest, Grant them thine eternal rest. Amen.
