

* Organ Postlude Fugue in E-flat major, BWV 552 ("St. Anne") - J.S. Bach

* Bach's *Fugue in E-flat major*, BWV 552 is rich in Trinitarian symbolism. The key signature itself has three flats; there are three distinct sections, each with a characteristic theme, which are combined to produce a dramatic conclusion. This fugue has the nickname "St. Anne", because of the striking similarity of its subject to the hymn tune of the same name, written by English composer, William Croft (1678-1727), which we sing to "O God our help in ages past".

It is a happy coincidence that Trinity Sunday coincides this year with the secular holiday of Father's Day. Athanasius reminds us that the concept of fatherhood is ultimately derived from the Father-Son relationship within the Trinity, and that our own adoption as sons and daughters by the Father is brought about through the Son by the Holy Spirit:

We too are made sons truly, and using the name of the Father we acknowledge from that name the Word in the Father. But if he wills that we should call his own Father our Father, we must on no account measure ourselves with the Son according to nature, for it is because of the Son that the Father is so called by us, for since the Word bore our body and came to be in us, therefore by reason of the Word in us names through us his own Father as ours, which in the Apostle's meaning when he says, 'God has sent forth the Spirit of his Son into your hearts, crying, Abba, Father.' (Gal. 4.6)

A Happy Father's Day to all Fathers as we contemplate our own relationship to the "one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all." (Eph 4:6)

- **3.** Your offering(s) are recorded against the date of the Sunday when it is received so please COMBINE OFFERINGS FOR MULTIPLE WEEKS into one envelope whenever possible.
- **4.** Avoid placing "LOOSE CHEQUES" on the offering plate: when you do that, our counters must create an audible paper record (or visitor's envelope) for you adding to their effort each Sunday but also potential errors in the counting process and records maintained by our Envelope Secretary.
